Phonics Screener Check



Phonics

Children begin to learn phonics (sounds) in Early Years, both in Nursery and Reception.

Once children learn sounds, they use this knowledge to read and write words.

Children can them see the purpose of learning sounds. For this reason, the first initial sounds they are taught are s, a, t, p, i, n.

These can immediately be blende for reading to make simple CVC words (Consonant, vowel, consonant) e.g. sat, pin. Children then develop segmenting for writing skills; breaking the word into sounds to spell it out.

Phonics Screening Check

Children in Year 1 throughout the country take part in a phonics screener check during the same week in June. Children who did not pass in year 2 will retake the phonics screener.

The phonics screening check is designed to confirm whether individual children have learnt sufficient phonics decoding and blending skills to an appropriate standard.

What happens during the test?

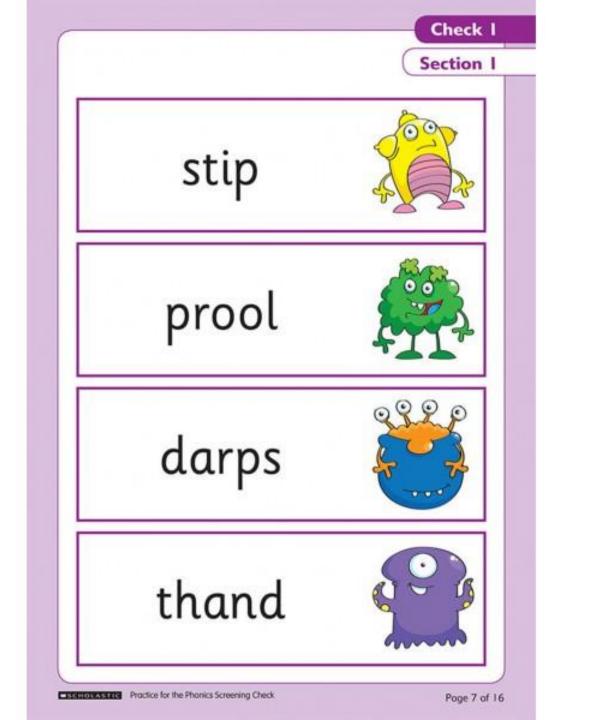
- The test contains 40 words
- Each child will sit one to one and read each word aloud to a teacher.
- The test will take approximately 10 minutes per child; although all children are different and will complete the check at their own pace.
- The list of words the children read are a combination of 20 real words and 20 pseudo words (nonsense/alien words).

Nonsense Words

The nonsense words will be shown to your child with a picture of an alien. This provides the children with a context for nonsense words which is independent from any existing vocabulary they may have.

Nonsense words are included because they will be new to all pupils; they do not favour children with good vocabulary knowledge or visual memory.
